
Puppet Power: Festival of Ideas: "Celebration" May 23 – 29, 2022

Message from Erin Prosser, Program Manager Puppet Power: Festival of Ideas



We engaged over 90 people including performers, puppeteers, and other professionals to support this years' ambitious program. I am deeply humbled and grateful to the over 40 volunteers who came out to support our in-person event, Highland Park Community Association for their partnership and collaboration, to our Technical Support Teams: Rockethouse, DayOne Media, and Chelsea Yang-Smith and of course to our small but mighty team at WP Puppet Theatre, Wendy, Barb, and Kira – there's no way we could have pulled this off without everyone rolling up their sleeves and stepping in to help.

When Wendy and I selected this year's theme of celebration almost 18 months before the event, we were imagining what a post-covid world might look like – and how we might celebrate or protest these times. I'm not sure that either of us anticipated the ongoing collective exhaustion or level of existing inequities that came to light during our planning phases.

We selected the quote below from Heschel, as inspiration and a starting point for conversation. As we all grew, grieved, and changed over the past couple of years my relationship to the quote has also changed. I have learned to honour and hold space both for the enjoyment of simply being entertained as well as for the active art of mindfully being present when in a state of celebration. I continue my journey to look up, notice, and listen to who is not celebrating and why. I have not yet mastered the ability to hold both joy and grief at the same time. I suppose that is part of our learning and the dichotomy of our collective human experience.


Thank you again to everyone who breathed some air into Puppet Power, no matter how small or large your contribution you had an impact, and I am grateful to you. - Erin

Thoughts from Wendy Passmore-Godfrey WPTS Artistic and Executive Director

Puppet Power Festival of Ideas launched back in 1999 as a means to inspire and support puppetry, specifically Applied Puppetry*. Over the years we have had amazing artists, dedicated volunteers, fantastic participants, wonderful supporters and partners.



The theme of Celebration, as with many of our themes, was interpreted by our presenters in many different ways. Personally, I enjoyed Matt Smith's short talk on Celebratory Art and his conclusions that

- Celebratory Art is an opportunity for the public to freely celebrate and change their environment
- It is important to construct our own rituals and celebrations to suit them
- Celebrations are a very important area of performance to study and research
- Artists can help facilitate and enrich both already established celebrations and create new ones
- Life without clearly marked celebrations can seem empty
- Performing objects can help us to celebrate

As we have in past years, we engaged an 'Animateur' to 'animate the ideas and inspiration'. Jeremiah Bartrum, Ottawa, rose to this unusual challenge with thoughtful insightful observations. I urge you to read his whole document but he concluded in words that stick with me...

We celebrate in the face of the fears and dark forces of our time, knowing that we belong to a community of artists, of puppeteers, of seekers, of peace makers and we are confident that our work, however intimate or grand in scale, has the power to change the world.

Puppet Power 2022 as both the online Festival of Ideas program and the in-person Family Festival Day had so many different aspects that resonated with so many people (as indicated in the surveys and the smiles on the faces) This is indeed a celebration that carries us into planning the next iterations! * Applied Puppetry is "puppetry that is used as a communication and expressive tool in settings such as education, therapeutic interventions, social action, institutions and other social settings".

Family Festival Day Kick Off

Puppet Power: Festival of Ideas kicked off with a live, in person event on May 23rd. Over 500 people joined us for our Family Festival Day as we celebrated puppets with families, children and the young at heart! We were honoured that Elder Hayden from Siksika Nation opened the day.

After that, all manner of fun events unfolded: Imaginarium Puppet Theatre performed from a funky gypsy wagon.

Tangle led puppet making of birds as well as the puppet parade.

Sandra Lamouche, world champion hoop dancer, did an awe-inspiring performance. Little Brown Jug Brass Band played exuberantly for the puppet parade.

Calgary Public Library Book Truck had a steady stream of book borrowers.

Tam Godfrey and his team led a workshop to build wooden puppets using only hand powered tools.

And we had face painting, kite making, green screen video, food trucks and ice cream, and much more. The Family Festival Day was a way to engage and connect with the community while promoting the art of puppetry and WP Puppet Theatre.



The Performances, Panels and Workshops

Over the course of seven days, Puppet Power: Festival of Ideas showcased more than 40 professional puppeteers and presenters in 30+ amazingly crafted live streamed online events. We also hosted a new event this year called "Intermissions!" – an online networking and idea exchange hosted by one of our presenters on a variety of thought-provoking topics.



While designed for everyone, the festival was of particular interest to educators, therapists, helping professionals, artists, students, thought leader and idea generators. More than just entertainment and information sharing, our Festival of Ideas was about making authentic connections, having meaningful conversations on important topics, and motivating a call to action to use the power of puppetry to impact positive social change.

Community Connection

As in previous years, and as part of our commitment to accessibility and to connect with our community, we offered free tickets to the performances and panels. We also offered bursaries. Additionally, we provided ASL interpretation for selected sessions. And translated two of the post festival recordings into Spanish.

The Post Festival recordings themselves provide access to those who can't attend the festival itself.



Marketing Highlights

World Puppetry Day:

The line up for Puppet Power: Festival of Ideas was announced through a series of videos and social media posts beginning on March 21. A highlight was the special lighting of the Calgary Tower in purple and yellow to honour world Puppetry Day and recognize puppetry as a global art form.

Six "Artists Series" blogs were created with one being released each week leading up to Puppet Power. The blogs were shared across social media and invited followers to enjoy the presentation of a puppeteer who was not performing at the festival but who had submitted an application. Doing this strengthened WP Puppet's connection with the larger, worldwide puppet community while also using its platforms to promote other artists, build and strengthen relationships and maintain a positive experience of the festival, even if the puppeteer ultimately wasn't chosen to perform at Puppet Power.

Newsletters:

Eleven (11) newsletters were sent, one every other week, leading up to Puppet Power, beginning on March 1st. The newsletters highlighted various aspects of the festival, announced speaker line up, promoted ticket sales and discounts, highlighted performers and those featured in our Artist Series blog.

- Sent to 4,476 contacts
- Open rate varied from 29% 35%
- 2% click rate

Attendance:

176 individual tickets were sold for the online Festival of Ideas 442 tickets were sold for the Family Festival Day 75 All Access Passes were accessed.

Peak Viewers for the online presentations was 404 people.

23 post Festival Recording packages were purchased.

Puppet Power: Festival of Ideas 2022 was an online conference with a live, in person kick-off event hosted at the Highland Park Community Association (HPCA) situated in northwest Calgary.

HPCA was a fantastic community partner to work with as they had a great indoor and outdoor space that was a perfect fit for the Family Festival Day events. Puppet making and the green screen video booth were housed inside while all other events were outdoors.

The partnership with the community association was terrific as was the collaboration with WPTS and HPCA in terms of promotion and sharing of information across social media channels.

More than 40 volunteers plus staff and contractors were onsite for the Family Festival Day and it is only through their dedication and offers to help were we able to host such a large event in a post-pandemic environment. We sincerely thank everyone who assisted with Puppet
